Enclosed is a signed statement dated 1/27/34 signed by one NELSON ABRAHAM and witnessed by PETE CRAWFORD and JOHN E. SMITH. PETE CRAWFORD is a former Texas Ranger who died several years ago. SMITH is unknown to law enforcement officers at Alpine, Texas. It is not known whether one of the witnesses or ABRAHAM typed the statement.

The statement was obtained on 5/27/57 from J. W. FRAZER, Brewster County and District Clerk, Alpine, and should be forwarded to El Paso for return to FRAZER upon completion of the examination. The FBI Laboratory is requested to compare the ABRAHAM signature appearing in the statement with a letter, now in possession of the FBI Laboratory, purportedly written by subject to HOWARD RUSHMORE in 1937. The Bureau is also requested to compare typewriting in the statement to any other specimens of subject's typewriting now in possession of the Laboratory.

For information of Indianapolis, the statement purports to be that of NELSON ABRAHAM, 24 years of age, born in Detroit, Michigan, nearest relatives, Mr. and Mrs. G. ABRAHAM, Chicago, Illinois, and reads as follows:

"I went up to the College between 5;30 and 6;00 in the evening or afternoon on 25th of January this year, I walked in the south door and it was in my mind to do some typing, I had permission of Dr. MORELOCK to use the typewriters, and the door to the typewriting room was locked, but the door to the office was open and there was a typewriter there, I assumed that this typewriter was property of the school, the same as the other typewriters as in the room that was locked, I typed on it for about 15 minutes in this office, I don't know where I went up there just to type or to take a typewriter, this is not clear in my mind.

On 5/28/57 Mrs. WINIFRED SLIGHT, Assistant Registrar, Sul Ross College, Alpine, advised SA LEON M. GASKILL that there is no record of enrollment for NELSON ABRAHAM in the files of her office. She advised that ABRAHAM could have used the facilities of the school without being a student.

J. C. COLEMAN, 708 East Avenue C, Alpine, retired Sul Ross Professor whose typewriter was stolen by ABRAHAM, recalled that ABRAHAM was a "Floater"; was not a student at Sul Ross, and would not have left any papers or other correspondence at the College.

Dr. HORACE MORELOCK, 708 East Avenue D, Alpine, retired Sul Ross College President, advised on 5/28/57 that he could not recall the "stolen typewriter" incident and was not acquainted with NELSON ABRAHAM.

HELSON ALGREN

The name of Nelson Algren appeared in a list of names of individuals who were signers of an open letter to Attorney General Biddle, urging the prosecution of "domestic Fascists," which letter was published in "Equal Justice." As you know, "Equal Justice" is a quarterly publication edited by the International Labor Defense, 112 East 19th Street, Room 504, New York City. This particular letter was contained in the Spring edition, 1942, Volume XVI, Number 2, of "Equal Justice."

Nelson Algren was also mentioned in "The New Masses," dated May 3, 1938, as one of the group of individuals who defended the Moscow purge trials.

With regard to Algren's approval of the Moscow purges, according to a Dies Committee report contained in House Resolution Number 282, Volume I, for August 12 to 23, inclusive, 1938, Algren was described, along with the other individuals sanctioning the purges, as a part of Communism's "antiseptic squad." Briefly, the Dies Committee indicated that this squad "comes to the front in the event of attempted deportation of alien 'Reds' and for the advancement of citizenship to aliens who refuse to swear allegiance to their country. In other words, its job is to defend Russia and Communism and to coo our people into calmness in the face of the reality of a 'Red' menace in the United States."

In another extract from hearings before the Dies Committee, it has been ascertained that Nelson Algren was included in a list of individuals elected to the National Council of the League of American Writers in 1935.

The name of Nelson Algren, designated as a Communist Party member, was contained on a partial list of delegates, alternates, officials, Party leaders, and observers attending the sessions of the Tenth National Convention of the Communist Party.

From an article entitled "American Writers Call for Second Front Now," which is carried on Page 5 of "The People's World" for September 23, 1942, it was ascertained that Nelson Algren was considered as one of the outstanding names in American letters of the day and was apparently connected with the League of American Writers.

The following article was copied from the "Hoosier Party Builder," published in Indianapolis, Indiana, dated December 3, 1937, concerning the above-captioned individual:

"For the Indianapolis comrades, a great many interesting events have been mapped out by the Drive Committee. On Dec. 19 JAN WITTENBER, business manager of the DAILY RECORD, will come to town bringing with him, Nelson Algren, author of "Momebody in Boots." A banquet to welcome the visitors (and, incidentally, to raise some money) is being held at the Russian Izba, 2135 N. Meridian St. An interesting program including speakers, singers and a trio has been arranged."

From information dated June 25, 1942 submitted by the Chicago Field Division concerning the Communist Party, District 8, of Chicago, Number 203, it is noted that Del Early spoke of Nelson Algren and Richard Wright as having been former pupils of his. Del Early at this time was speaking before the last class of the term of the school in fundamentals for Issy Taylor Finkelberg, at the Workers School, 64 West Randolph. He gave a very brief resume of the Party in this country and a glance at the

Selective Service

HIME, Clerk, Selective Service System, Chicago, 525 South Plymouth Court, on March 14, 1950 made available the Selective Service file of NEISON ALGREN ABRAHAM (changed to NEISON ALGREN by court order, January 26, 1944), born March 28, 1909 at Detroit, Michigan, which reflects that he registered with Local Beard #60 on October 11, 1940 and was assigned order number 1856.

Education

The Selective Service file of NEISON ALGHEN reflects that he attended the University of Illinois for four years and studied journalism. The Selective Service file does not reflect that ALGREN graduated from this school nor was any dates of attendance given.

The Chicago Tribune edition of March 17, 1950 reports that NEISON ALGREN, author of "Man With the Golden Arm," is a graduate of the University of Illinois.

Previous Residences

The Selective Service file of NEISON ALGREN reflects that he previously resided at the following residences in Chicago:

E2322 Victoria Avenue - 1941. 1907 Evergreen - As of June 11, 1942. 2717 Lawrence Avenue - As of December 11, 1945.

Marriage Data

The Selective Service file of NELSON ALGREN reflects that he married his wife, AMANDA, on March 1, 1957 at Chicago.

File number 46S-9406 in Superior Court, Cook County, Chicago, as reviewed on March 14, 1950, reflects that NEISON ALGHEN, 1525 Wabansia, was granted a divorce from AMANDA ALGHEN on October 17, 1946 on the grounds that she deserted him as of June 15, 1943.

Criminal Record

The Subject's name was checked against the arrest records of the Chicago Police Department on February 3, 1950 with negative results.

The Selective Service file of NEISON ALGREN reflects that he admitted being arrested and convicted of a felony on March 15, 1934 at Alpine County, Alpine, Texas. The Subject's Selective Service file contains a letter dated July 22, 1941 from J. W. FRAZER, County and District Clerk, Brewster County, Alpine, Texas, addressed to the Selective Service System, Chicago, Local Board #60, which reflects that NEISON ABRAHAM was convicted of theft of personal property valued at more than \$50.00 on February 21, 1954 and given a two year sentence in the Penitentiary. This sentence was suspended pending the good behavior of the Subject but he never appealed and had the judgment of the court set aside at the expiration of the time.

Miscellaneous

The Chicago Tribune issue of March 17, 1950 reports that NEISCN ALGREN was named the winner of the 1949 National Book Award for his novel "The Man With the Golden Arm."

ACTIVITIES ANDAFFILIATIONS

League of American Writers and Commonwealth College

Chicago T-2, of known reliability, advised on February 10, 1941 that NEISON ALGHEN, author, was President of the Chicago Chapter of the League of American Writers and was also a member of the American Writers Union and participated in a re-organization of the American Writers Union, making it a permanent feature of Commonwealth College, Mena, Arkansas.

T-2 advised in 1943 that NEISON ALGREN was a member of the Communist Party and also a member of the American Writers Congress and that he was in touch with the Abraham Lincoln School, Chicago.

The Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, report of March 29, 1944, Page 82, reflects that the American Writers Congress was sponsored by the League of American Writers.
